

Beaverton police arrested a predatory sex offender on a parole warrant Tuesday night.



The [Washington County Community Corrections Department](#) warned the public Tuesday that [Shawn John Cutler](#) had not returned to the Washington County Corrections Center, 260 S.W. Adams Ave. in Hillsboro, since Sunday.

Cutler had been staying at the corrections center since his release from prison on Sept. 12. A parole warrant was issued on Tuesday for his arrest.

A Beaverton officer was dispatched to Northwest Bethany Boulevard and U.S. 26 around 7:17 p.m. on the report of a man walking in the road, said Officer Mike Rowe, public information officer for Beaverton police.

The officer initially couldn't find the man but later found him in the [14000 block of Northwest Cornell Road](#) in Beaverton. The officer stopped the man, who was Cutler, and arrested him, Rowe said.

Legal Status/Convictions: Mr. Cutler is on Post-prison Supervision for Burglary 1 and Robbery II until September 11, 2017. Mr. Cutler is being released from Oregon State Penitentiary on September 12, 2014; he has been incarcerated since October of 2007. He will be residing at the Washington County Community Corrections Center located at 260 SW Adams BLVD Hillsboro, OR 97124.

Special Conditions of Probation/Parole/Post-Prison Supervision: Mr. Cutler is not allowed to have contact with any minors or go to any place where minors congregate (i.e. parks, schools, arcades) or have contact with his victims. Mr. Cutler is not allowed to use or possess drugs, or pornographic material of any kind. He will be directed to engage in sex offender treatment, submit to polygraphs, and will meet with his supervising officer frequently. He was designated a Predatory Sex Offender in 1997 and will be under supervision with Washington County Parole and Probation, Sex Crimes Team.

Prior Convictions: Mr. Cutler has adult criminal history dating back to 1987-present, including Possession charges, sex offenses, kidnapping, burglary, robbery, and assaults. Sex Offense Convictions: Multnomah County (10/94) – Sex Abuse 1: (1/91) – Attempt to commit Sodomy 1st Degree, Robbery 2nd Degree, and Intimidation 2nd Degree.

Target Population: Mr. Cutler's sex offense victims were both unrelated males and females, females were 16-years-of age, and the unknown male was 18-years-of age.

Hillsboro police say man tried two carjackings after running from Community Corrections Center

Hillsboro police have accused a man of attempting to carjack two people after running from the **Washington County Community Corrections Center** Thursday afternoon.

About 4:15 p.m., the man ran from the corrections center, a 215-bed transitional facility at **260 S.W. Adams Ave.** where he is in custody, said Lt. Mike Rouches, a Hillsboro police spokesman. Staff members chased after him.

The man ran to East Main Street and headed east. He rushed into the U.S. Bank, located at **Southeast Second Avenue and Main Street**. Inside, he yelled, "This is a robbery!" before running out another door, Rouches said.

He next headed behind the **Venetian Theatre & Bistro**, Rouches said. There, an employee was arriving for work and getting out of his car. The man ran up to the employee, and tried to jump into the employee's car, Rouches said.

He yelled for the employee to help him, Rouches said, while he tried to get into the driver's seat. The employee reportedly shoved him away.

The man took off again toward the **400 block of East Main Street**, Rouches said. He hopped over a small fence, Rouches said, and spotted a woman getting out of an SUV.

He tried to get into her SUV, Rouches said, but the woman managed to first get inside and shut the door.

Police soon found the man and took him into custody. They identified him as 28-year-old Christopher J. Hawkins, Rouches said.

The incident, police said, was over within 10 minutes.

Rouches wasn't sure why Hawkins was in custody at the Community Corrections Center. Court records show he has pleaded guilty to theft, assault and drug charges.

He was taken to the **Washington County Jail**.

Telly Heath pleads guilty to Hillsboro burglaries, sex crimes, receives nearly 38 years in prison

A 34-year-old man was sentenced Tuesday in Washington County to nearly 38 years in prison after he admitted to **burglary and sex crimes he committed last summer**.

During a July heat spell, Telly Alexander Heath climbed into the open first-floor windows of two Hillsboro homes, said Deputy District Attorney Jeff Lesowski.

The first time, in the early morning hours of July 7, he chose an apartment unit just across the street from the **Luke-Dorf facility**, where he was staying.

He grabbed a laptop and cell phone in the apartment, picked up a knife in the kitchen and then wandered into the bedroom of a sleeping 21-year-old woman.

She woke to him standing there with a knife, Lesowski said. He then raped her twice.

Before he left, he returned the woman's laptop and cell phone and demanded that she give him her phone number.

The next day, again in the early morning, he entered a home several blocks from the Luke-Dorf where an 11-year-old girl lived. The girl didn't usually sleep downstairs, Lesowski said, but her bedroom upstairs was too hot that night, so she opted for the cooler downstairs guest bedroom.

She awoke shortly after he entered the house, Lesowski said, and she listened to him meander around the first floor for an hour. After he discovered that the girl was in the bedroom, he returned to the room three times with a knife from the kitchen and sexually abused her each time.

When he left, he took the girl's mother's cell phone with him and told her not to tell anyone what had happened.

Watching him leave, Lesowski said, the girl slammed the front door shut behind him, and her mother woke to the noise. The girl's mom called police, but Heath didn't turn up in their search.

Right after Heath left the girl's house, he placed a call on the stolen cell phone to his first victim, the 21-year-old woman whose phone number he had demanded.

Police tracked Heath using the cell phone's signal, which led them to his bedroom at Luke-Dorf. He left with a suitcase just before they arrived.

Soon after, police caught up with him at the **Orengo Tri-Met station**, read him his Miranda rights and took him back to the station for questioning, Lesowski said.

In an interview, Heath reportedly told police he'd had consensual sex with the 21-year-old woman and denied the second incident.

State crime lab results showed that a hair found on the gloves he was wearing during both incidents belonged to the girl, Lesowski said.

In the case involving the 21-year-old, Heath was charged with two counts of first-degree rape, one count of first-degree unlawful sexual penetration and three counts of first-degree burglary.

In the case involving the girl, he was charged with four counts of first-degree sex abuse, four counts of attempted first-degree sodomy and four counts of first-degree burglary.

Heath's case was set to begin trial Tuesday morning, but he instead decided to plead guilty to all the charges against him.

In May, Heath pleaded guilty to unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, and he was on probation at the time of the crimes. Lesowski said Heath received probation instead of prison time in that case because he was accepted into **mental health court**. Washington County's mental health court ordered Heath to stay at the Luke-Dorf facility.

Judge Gayle Nachtigal accepted Heath's plea and imposed a sentence between the mandatory minimum sentence of eight years and four months and a maximum of nearly 48 years.
